
LGC Newsletter

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HORTICULTURE

My fellow co-horts, it's time to get ready and excited for our May sweeps. PLEASE HAVE ALL PLANT MATERIAL IN PLACE BY 8:45 AM AT DIANE STONER'S BARN. We are going with our typical May Sweeps:

Class 1. Flowering Shrubs

Single specimen, not to exceed 36" from tip to cut end (please choose a container that can support such a large cutting)

- 1. Viburnum Viburnum
- 2. Syringa Lilac
- 3. Other

Class 2. Narcissus

- 1. Daffodil, one cut specimen, no foliage
- 2. Narcissus Daffodil, three different types (and color) of cut specimen, no foliage

Class 3. Tulipa

- 1. Tulipa Tulip, one cut specimen with two attached leaves
- 2. Tulipa Tulip, three different types (and color) of cut specimen with two attached leaves

Class 4. Other bulbs

1. Other bulbs - one cut specimen

Class 5. Perennials

1. A single cut specimen, any genus and/or cultivar

Class 6. A flowering Potted Plant owned for 1 year or more. This is to prepare you all for a typical PAR class. I am really hoping to see some wild goodies!

Class 1 An image depicting flowering shrub(s) and/or tree(s) in glorious spring array in a natural setting.

Class 2 A macro or close-up of a spring bloom - daffodils, tulips, pansies, the choice is yours.

Class 3 An environmental portrait of a gardener working in a garden, field, greenhouse, yard, farm, etc. The gardener does not have to be a garden club member.

An environmental portrait is a portrait executed in the subject's usual environment, such as in their home or workplace, and typically illuminates the subject's life and surroundings. VISITING GARDENS LOCAL TRIP, TAPPING REEVE MEADOW Tuesday, May 14, 2019 @ 10:30 am

This is a reminder of our upcoming tour of Tapping Reeve on Tuesday May 14th at 10:30am. Bring your lunch; dessert and beverages will be provided. Details below:

Kate Zullo from the Historical Society Museum will give us a guided tour of the newly installed meadows behind the Tapping Reeve House. With the assistance of Landscape Architect Lauren Richardson, the Litchfield Historical Society has reimagined the six acre Tapping Reeve site, not as a strict interpretation of the time period, but rather as a community resource with landscape elements that would have been found on the site, and in Litchfield, from the 18th to the 20th centuries. The project will use elements of the historic landscape as an educational tool and includes a children's garden, educational pavilion, small orchard, a chestnut grove, a wet meadow, stone walls and traditional fencing. The Society has designed the project to provide the community and visitors with opportunities for learning, relaxation and reflection. This new exhibit will be part of our permanent collection, just in time for Litchfield's 300th anniversary next year.

After our tour we will gather at the Tapping Reeve Gazebo and enjoy a BYO lunch (Bring your own). Rosie Furniss, Susan Magary and I will provide beverages and desserts. It will be a morning of learning and ending with LGC members enjoying a casual lunch with other garden club members. The Tapping Reeve House and Law School will also be open for all who want to wander about. Cathy Fields, LHS Director, is hoping to join us. We hope you will all come!
